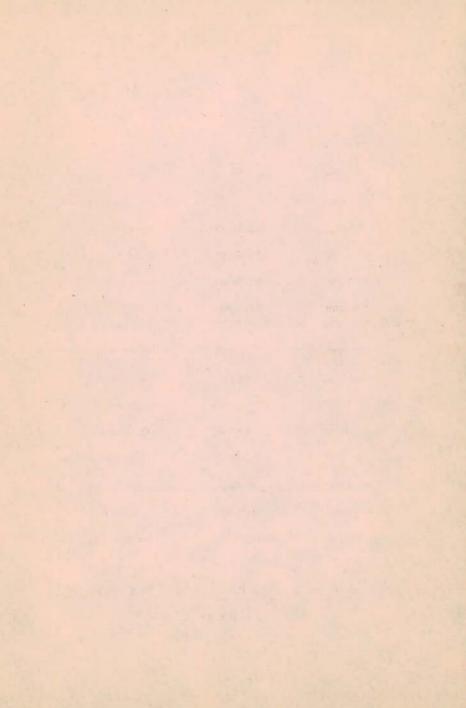

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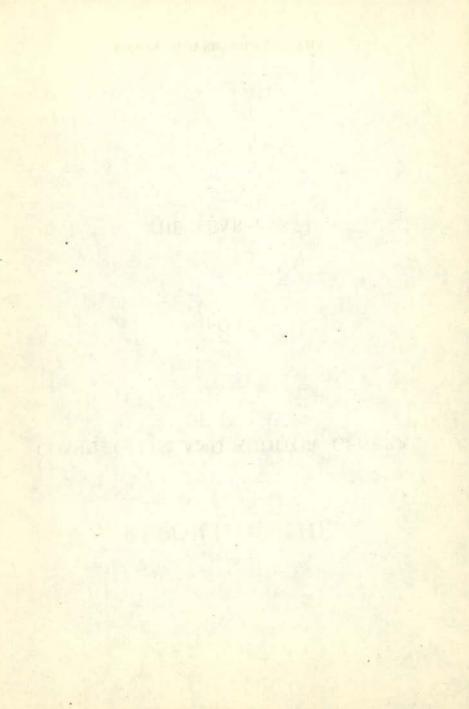
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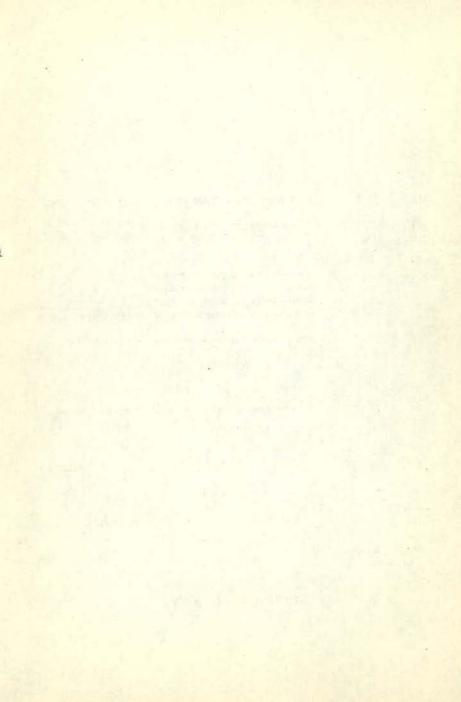

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#### PREFATORY REMARKS

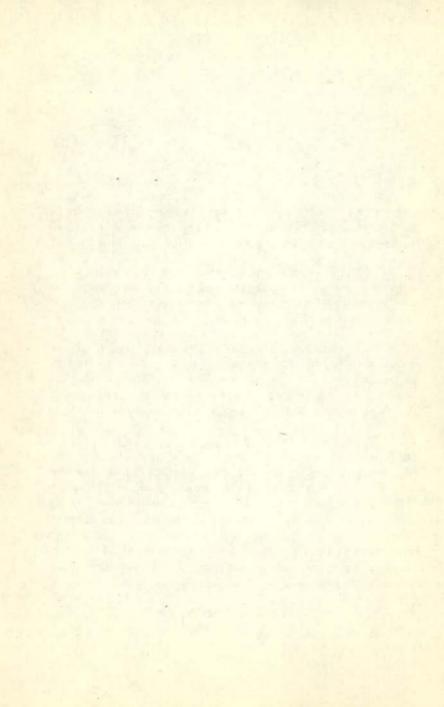
An Advance Report for the year 1978-79—Union Government (Civil) was submitted to the President under Article 151 of the Constitution pending submission of the accounts of the Union Government for the year 1978-79. Following finalisation of the accounts of the Union Government for the year 1978-79, this Report has been prepared for submission to the President under Article 151 of the Constitution. It relates mainly to matters arising from the Appropriation Accounts of the Union Government (Civil) for 1978-79 prepared (with a few exceptions) by the Controller General of Accounts and test checked in audit.

The Report also includes in Chapter I certain points of interest arising from the Finance Accounts of the Union Government for 1978-79 under consolidation by the Controller General of Accounts and based on the information furnished by the Controller General of Accounts/Controllers of Accounts.

The cases mentioned in the Report are among those which came to notice in the course of test audit during the year 1978-79 as well as those which came to notice in earlier years but could not be dealt with in the previous Reports.

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The points brought out in this Report are not intended to convey or to be understood as conveying any general reflection on the financial administration by the departments/authorities concerned.



#### CHAPTER I

#### **I-GENERAL**

The original budget estimates and actuals of revenue receipts, expenditure met from revenue and expenditure on capital account during 1978-79 are shown below with the corresponding figures for the preceding two years :

NOTE—The figures for 1978-79 contained in this Chapter are those furnished by the Controller General of Accounts (CGA)/Controllers of Accounts; these could not be verified in audit from the Union Government Finance Accounts for 1978-79 under preparation by the CGA (March 1980) (Prefatory Remarks may also be referred to). During 1978-79, the revenue receipts and the expenditure met from revenue exceeded the budget estimates by Rs. 443.73 crores and Rs. 108.43 crores respectively. The expenditure on capital account was, however, less than the budget estimates by Rs. 362.50 crores.

During the course of the year, supplementary grants for expenditure were obtained, the effect of which was to increase the above estimates of expenditure met from revenue and expenditure on capital account by Rs. 742.61 crores and \*Rs. 102.60 crores respectively.

Further details of revenue receipts have been given in the Report on Revenue Receipts.

Rs. 8357.61\* crores. Against this investment, the amount brought to account during 1978-79 by way of dividend was Rs. 61.29 crores. The dividend in the two preceding years was Rs. 62.79 crores (1977-78) and Rs. 34.44 crores (1976-77). Particulars of the main investments and dividends are given in Appendix I. It will be seen that if net expansion of treasury bills and conversion of *ad hoc* treasury bills of Rs. 100 crores into dated securities during the years 1976-77 and 1977-78 are taken into account the overall deficit during these years was Rs. 154.14 crores and Rs. 842.12\* crores respectively. During the year 1978-79, no conversion of *ad hoc* treasury bills was carried out into dated securities. However, if the net expansion of treasury bills is taken into account during 1978-79, the overall deficit during the year was Rs. 1752.91 crores.

In January 1964, Government decided that the entire loss not exceeding 10 per cent of the total loans advanced to States for rehabilitation of displaced persons from West Pakistan would be borne by the Union Government. In May 1964, it was decided by Government that losses on loans granted upto 31st March 1964 to displaced persons, who migrated from erstwhile East Pakistan upto 31st December 1963, would be borne fully

19. Assistance to various countries.—Government of India has been rendering assistance to various countries under the Colombo Plan and Special Commonwealth African Assistance Plan. The aid rendered under the Colombo Plan was Rs. 10.54 crores during 1978-79 and Rs. 151.63 crores upto 1978-79 of which Rs. 143.97 crores were to Nepal (for national highways, hydro-electric projects, minor irrigation works, village development programme, training of technical personnel and services of Indian experts). The aid rendered under the Special Commonwealth African Assistance Plan was Rs. 14 lakhs during 1978-79 and \*Rs. 190 lakhs upto the end of 1978-79.

In addition, Government has also given loans to foreign countries; the amount outstanding on that account at the close of 1978-79 was Rs. 251.31 crores.

20. Guarantees given by the Union Government.-During 1978-79 Government issued guarantees in 153 cases (including renewal of old guarantees) for Rs. 2696.85 crores. The total amount guaranteed by Government outstanding at the end of 1978-79 was Rs. 1295.65 crores (including certain cases where the sums are payable in foreign currencies). The guarantees were given for loans raised by 19 Joint stock compnies. 59 Government companies, 2 statutory corporations, 4 port trusts, 5 co-operative banks, 88 co-operative societies, 1 State Financial Corporation, 2 consumer co-operative societies and an autonomous body and Industrial Development Bank. In addition, Government has also guaranteed a minimum dividend on the share capital of certain corporations, as also payment of interest on debentures etc., floated by them. The following guarantees were invoked during 1978-79 and payments made by Government :--

- (i) Branch line railway companies.—Government has guaranteed a net return of 3½ per cent /5 per cent per annum on the paid up share capital of branch line railway companies. The guarantee was invoked during 1978-79 in the case of three companies and Rs. 15.94 lakhs were paid by Government.
- (ii) Credit guarantees scheme for small scale industries.— During 1978-79, Rs. 129.20 lakhs were paid by governnent on account of default in repayment of loans/ idvances for the guarantees invoked.

21. Contributions to International Organisations.—The total amount of contributions to international bodies made during 1978-79 was Rs. 2047.96 lakhs. The more important contri-

The overall saving of Rs. 1451.68 crores represents about 3.1 per cent of the total amount of voted grants and charged appropriations; it was the net result of savings of Rs. 556.89 crores in 134 grants/appropriations in the revenue section and Rs. 924.08 crores in 80 grants/appropriations in the capital section and excess of Rs. 7.50 crores in 5 grants/appropriations in the revenue section and Rs. 21.79 crores in 1 grant in the capital section. The savings in 1978-79 have been analysed in paragraph 25.

23. Supplementary grants/appropriations.—During the year supplementary provision of Rs. 603.38 crores and Rs. 597.73 crores were obtained under 35 and 23 grants in the revenue and capital sections respectively. Supplementary appropriations of Rs. 79.01 crores and Rs. 13096.05 crores were also obtained for charged expenditure under 15 and 13 appropriations in the revenue and capital sections respectively.

Saving occurred mainly under 'BB.—Capital Outlay on Power Projects : BB.2—Hydro Electric Schemes : BB.2(7)— Other Expenditure : BB.2(7)(1)—Investment in National Hydro-Electric Power Corporation of India' (Rs. 71.60 crores) and was due to less investment in the Corporation following nontransfer of Salal Hydro Electric Project to the Corporation owing to non-completion of legal formalities and consequential nonadjustment of cost of its assets and for maintenance of parity in debt-equity ratio (1 : 1) for Loktak Project.

#### Ministry of Finance

26. Expenditure on "New Service/New Instrument of Service".— In July 1970, on the recommendations of the Public Accounts Committee, Government had, *inter alia*, prescribed certain limits for different categories of expenditure beyond which the expenditure constituted "new service" or "new instrument of service" and required prior approval of Parliament. During test check in audit of the accounts for 1977-78 and 1978-79, the following cases were noticed in which the prescribed limits were exceeded and the expenditure constituted "new service" or "new instrument of service", but no advance from the Contingency Fund was obtained nor prior approval of Parliament taken.

## (i) Ministry of Energy

(Grant No. 29-Power Development for 1978-79)

The Department of Power paid Rs. 36.11 lakhs during 1978-79 as subsidy to the Bharat Heavy Electricals Ltd. against a provision of Rs. 20 lakhs in the Budget Estimates. The additional payment of subsidy of Rs. 16.11 lakhs was in excess of the prescribed limit of Rs. 10 lakhs and was met by re-appropriation within the grant.

#### (ii) Department of Science and Technology

(Grant No. 77-Department of Science and Technology for 1977-78)

The Department of Science and Technology paid Rs. 77.94 lakhs during 1977-78 as grants-in-aid to the Bose Institute, Calcutta against the provision of Rs. 40 lakhs for the purpose in the Budget Estimates. The increased payment was stated to be mainly for enabling the Institute to meet additional expenditure on speedy construction of laboratory building for which a provision of Rs. 2 lakhs had been included in the Budget Estimates. The additional payment of Rs. 37.94 lakhs was in excess of the prescribed limit of Rs. 10 lakhs and was met by re-appropriation within the grant.

## (iii) Ministry of Planning

## (Grant No. 73-Statistics for 1978-79)

Y

The Ministry of Planning (Planning and Statistics) paid Rs. 361.63 lakhs during 1978-79 as grants-in-aid to the Indian Statistical Institute, Calcutta against a provision of Rs. 287.10 lakhs in the Budget Estimates. The increased payment was stated to be for enabling the Institute to meet additional expenditure on existing services (Rs. 54.53 lakhs) and expenditure on the new scheme of Development of the Bangalore Centre (Rs. 20 lakhs) for which no provision was made in the original budget. The additional payment of Rs. 74.53 lakhs exceeded the prescribed limit of Rs. 30 lakhs and was met by re-appropriation within the grant.

## MINISTRY OF PETROLEUM, CHEMICALS AND FERTILIZERS

27. Release of funds to the Oil Industry Development Board to avoid surrender of budget provision.—Funds to the extent of Rs. 78.40 crores were provided in Grant No. 70-Petroleum and Petro-Chemicals Industries for 1978-79 for payment to Oil Industry Development Board against collection of cess on indigenous crude oil. This was reduced to Rs. 20 crores in the Revised Estimates for 1978-79. In March 1979, just before the release of funds, the Board had in its bank account a balance of Rs. 49.43 crores and the demands for release of loans etc. to the Oil Industry at that time did not exceed Rs. 39.52 crores and could be met from Board's existing resources; Rs. 20 crores provided for in the Revised Estimates for 1978-79 were, however, released on 15th March 1979 in favour of the Board.

Government stated (November 1979) that the funds were allowed to be withdrawn for keeping reserve for urgent and unforeseen demands and for creating a minimum amount of cushion for providing funds for urgent schemes in 1979-80 pending 'vote on account'. Considering the balance available with the Board, the release of Rs. 20 crores to it was not justified by its need and the payment had apparently been made to avoid lapse of budget grant.

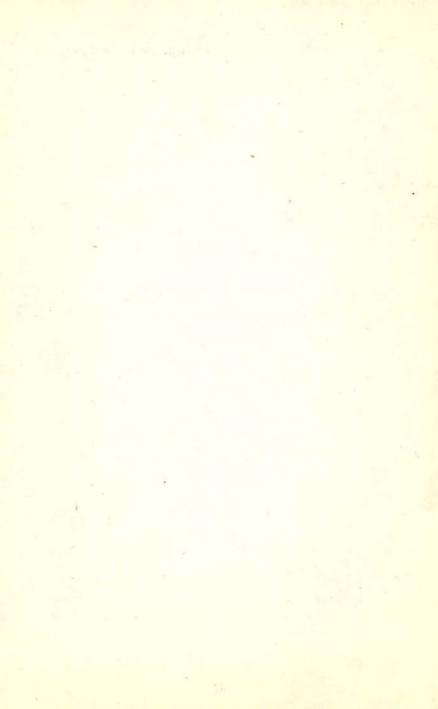
