THE trial of Nathuram Vinayak Godse, alleged assailant of Mahatma Gandhi, and eight others, including Mr. Vinayak Damodar Savarkar, also alleged to be implicated in the crime, is expected to begin towards the end of the third week of May. It will be held in the Red Fort, Delhi.

The charges against the accused include conspiracy, murder and offences under the Arms Act.

A notification in the "Gazette of India Extraordinary" dated May 15, 1948, says that Mr. Atma Charan, I.C.S., Judge, Special Court, Delhi, is to try the case.

Besides N. V. Godse and Mr. V. D. Savarkar, the accused include Narayan Dattatraya Apte, Vishnu Ramkrishna Karkare, Digambar Ramchandra Badge, Madanlal slo Kashmirilal Pahwa, Shankar so Kistayya, Gopal Vinayak Godse and Datta raya Sadashiv Parchure.

CHEERING CROWDS

Award Of French **Decoration**

PARIS, May 14.

Thousands of Parisians thronged the streets of their flag and flower bedecked city to-day to cheer Princess Elizabeth and the Duke of Edinburgh as they began their five-day visit to the French capital.

The Princess and her husband called on M. Vincent Auriol, the French President, at the Elysee Palace shortly after noon. Tremendous cheers greeted them from the waiting crowds. Here she was due to receive the Grand Cross of the Legion. Honour, which she will wear at a dinner in her nonour this evening.



"No Move To Prolong "STATE OF ISRAEL" SET UP BY PALESTINE JEWS

End Of 25-Year British Mandate In Holy Land

TEL-AVIV, May 14. THE newly-born Jewish State tonight warned its citizens to be prepared for the possibility of invasion and air raids, as Egyptian and Arab armies stood ready, less than 100 miles away, to invade Palestine the instant the 25-year British mandate ended at midnight tonight.

The Jews proclaimed the new 'State of Israel" eight hours before the mandate was due to

Reckoning with the probability that Arab planes would sweep in with the invading forces, the Haganan High Command called for a partial black-out in Jewish cities from tonight and ordered trenches to be dug in rural settlements.

The State of Israel's first official act tonight was to revoke the British White Paper of 1939 limiting Jewish immigration to Palestine and limiting land sales to Jews.

HIGH COMMISSIONER LEAVES

The last British High Commissioner, Sir Alan Cunningham, heard guns echoing in the hills round the Holy City, when he left Jerusalem for Haifa this morning as the Union Jack was hauled down from British headquarters at the famous bombblasted King David Hotel.
